SAMUEL KEMPER DAVIS

Sam was born on June 9, 1943 in NYC son of Elizabeth Kemper Davis and Albert Samuel Davis. He grew up in Somerville, New Jersey graduating with honors from Somerville High School in 1961 where, according to his yearbook his ambition was to become a minister (albeit, a Dutch Reformed minister!). After graduating from Wesleyan University in Middletown, Connecticut with an honors degree in English, he decided that he wanted to teach on a college level. With that goal in mind, he spent a year of graduate study on a Rotary International fellowship in Adelaide, Australia, and then, was accepted into the Phd program at the University of Chicago's Divinity School in the field of Theology and Literature. He received his Masters degree and was approved to begin his doctoral thesis when a certain Bob Homer called to see if he might do a summer "fill in" at the Montezuma and Fosterville United Methodist churches.

That summer proved to be a real turning point in his life's direction. He loved pastoring those churches and, after one more year in Chicago, he came east to the then, Central NY Conference, and stayed for the next thirty years. He joyfully served United Methodist churches in Middlesex (1973-1976), Skaneateles (1976-1984), Seneca Falls (1984-1989), Potsdam (1989-2000), and Fayetteville (2000-2001).

Sam met Joan Davis in Bourne, MA in the summer of 1964. They were married by her father, Rev. Warren G. Odom and Rev. Lester Schaff at St. Paul's United Methodist Church in Syracuse, NY on June 24, 1967. Their son Andrew, now living in NYC was born

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in Chicago in 1972. Jeremy, now in Mattapoisett, MA, was born during their pastorate in Skaneateles in 1977.

Sam served on several conference committees including BOOM and was always active in the communities in which he served.

In May of 2001, Sam was diagnosed with a glioblastoma brain tumor. With the love and support of family, friends and our church families, Sam lived for three and a half years, never complaining and always feeling that he was a blessed man. He died, at home in Syracuse NY on September 20, 2004. He died with a CD of Brahm's Requiem – his favorite piece of music and a rousing Welsh men's chorus playing at his bedside. A memorial service was held October 2, 2004 at the Fayetteville United Methodist Church with Rev. Nancy Rehkugler and Rev. Paul Gongloff officiating. Another memorial service was held at the Potsdam United Methodist Church in January, 2005 with Rev. Mary Guy officiating. His ashes were interred on October 9, 2004 in the family plot in Bourne, MA.

Sam was passionate about his family and friends, about pastoring and preaching and about learning and teaching. He loved a good stimulating conversation, a good laugh, times spent in the out of doors and could lose himself in a piece of music. He also loved his trains, camera and bicycle! Sam simply loved life.

I've been reading Edwin Way Teale's A Walk Through The Year this summer while on the Cape. Teale quoted Rabindranath Tagore who was talking about the endless beauty of the world "When I go hence let this be my parting word: what I have seen is unsurpassable". I know that Sam felt that too.

IVAN V. GREENFIELD



Ivan Victor Greenfield was born in New Haven, NY, on September 2, 1921, to Victor and Mildred Wall Greenfield. He grew up in Phoenix, NY, and graduated high school from there in 1939. With two sisters and one brother growing up in the depression era, Ivan always said that his family was poor, but really didn't know it. Ivan's father was a World War I veteran of both the Army and Navy, and instilled in his children a sense of patriotism and community contribution. Ivan's father loved to hunt and fish, and passed that love on to Ivan, also.

After completing high school, Ivan took a job washing dishes at a diner, and later worked in the restaurant of a steel mill. He claims that because of his dish washing experience, that qualified him to be an army cook when he joined the 17th Airborne Division as it was formed in April 1943. Before entering the army, he met and married Marjorie Suits on November 20, 1941, at Community Church, Baldwinsville, NY, with the Rev. Clyde Gault officiating. Ivan and Marjorie were advocates of large loving families, and they had six children; 2 girls and 4 boys.

In 1948, Ivan and Marjorie felt the call to Christian ministry and sold their home, quit the steel mill job and moved to Houghton in June. Ivan attended summer school, and then took a full college course for four years, graduating from Houghton College in June 1952. He was ordained as an elder in the Wesleyan Church July 2, 1952; and ordained as an elder in the United Methodist Church on May 21, 1961. Reverend Greenfield served churches in Madison, Newport, Dexter, Sulphur Springs, Sandy Creek, Ilion, and Verona before retiring and moving to Florida.

In addition to church activities, the Greenfields enjoyed square dancing, camping with their family, golf, bowling, outdoor activities, serving as counselors to youth camps, and they did extensive traveling.

Rev. Greenfield is survived by his wife, Marjorie; daughter, Nancy Greenfield; three sons and their wives, Robert and Kathleen Greenfield, Dr. Philip Greenfield and Dr. Lee Harrison, and Donald and Judi Greenfield; a daughter-in-law, Martha Greenfield, a

REV. CLIFFORD W. SULLIVAN, TH.D.



The Rev. Clifford W. Sullivan, Th. D., age 84 died on Tuesday, May 10, 2005 in Rome, New York. He was born in Kankakee, Illinois on December 15, 1920 to Owen and Agnes Halifax Sullivan. When he was very young, his mother died and he was raised by his Grandmother, Laura Walker, in Goreville, Illinois. He attended area schools and graduated from Goreville High School. While growing up his friends called him Cliff or "Sully".

On April 12, 1944 Cliff received his Local Preachers License in the Carbondale District of Southern Illinois and was Supply Pastor for several churches.

During World War II he served in the United States Army, 124th. Calvary Regiment in the Asiatic Pacific Theater.

After being discharged from the Army in 1946, he continued as Local Pastor and entered Southern Illinois University, graduating in 1951 with a BA Degree. He completed Theological Studies with Candler School of Theology in 1955 and was ordained Elder by Bishop Brashares with full Membership Status in the Southern Illinois Conference.

Other degrees were:

1956-1961 received Bachelor of Divinity, Masters of Divinity and Doctor of Theology from Evangelical College and Seminary.

Graduate Studies 1980-1981, Doctor of Theology from Trinity Theological Seminary in Newburgh, Indiana

In 1956 Rev. Sullivan transferred to the Northern New York Conference serving several churches until 1970.

While serving at a church near Rome State School, an institution for the developmentally disabled, he began giving Sunday afternoon services to the Protestant

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residents. This began his Ministry of dedication to meeting the religious/spiritual needs of the mentally retarded. He felt led to become a Mental Health Chaplain not only to the many residents but also the employees. Over the years as Chaplain and Director of Religious Affairs at the Rome Developmental Center, he found the developmentally disabled sincerely believed and actually know that God loves them and watches over them. They revere the Bible and its message, appreciated the opportunity to worship, to sing and participate in prayer.

This ministry lasted nearly thirty-five years. When questioned by Clergy and others if his ministry was challenging he replied, "It is the greatest challenge that I have encountered since I began my ministry".

Accreditations for Chaplaincy at Rome Developmental Center:

1969 – 1972 CPE from Binghamton State Hospital; 1972 Commission on Institutional Ministry – NY Council of Churches-Department of Mental Hygiene; 1980 AMHC Ecclesiastical Endorsement; 1981 AAPC

Rev. Sullivan retired from the Rome DDSO in 1991 at the age of 71. A few months later he returned part time to Walsh Complex giving Sunday services there and at the residences in the community. He worked until his health prevented his continuation and retired again in 2002 at the age of 81.

The following paragraph was written by the Central NY Developmental Service Office staff at the time of his funeral:

"Reverend Sullivan was Chaplain at the Rome State School/Rome Developmental Center/Rome DDSO for nearly 35 years before his retirement in 2002. He provided on and off-site religious services for persons with disabilities and was the driving force that forged relationships between the DSO and local churches and synagogues as the Developmental Center closed and people with disabilities were afforded the opportunity to live in residences in our community. Rev. Sullivan is credited with the establishment of a committee comprised of persons with disabilities, employees, clergy and volunteers to address spiritual needs of people with disabilities, and his guidance and influence has led to the continuation of this effort today. His leadership and dedication insured that opportunities for faith, worship and fellowship are afforded to all. Rev. Sullivan's patience, devout service, and benevolence will be missed by all his friends at CNY DSO".

In 1940 he married Myra June Mescher and three daughters were born; Meredith, Sheila and Debra. He later married Barbara Gala.

Surviving are his wife Barbara, daughters Sheila Schuman, Debra Sullivan, step-daughter Valerie Semeran, step-son Steven Gala, eleven grandchildren and twenty-three great-grandchildren. He was predeceased by his daughter Meredith Truman who died in 1996.

The funeral service was held in the First United Methodist Church on May 14, 2005 in Rome, New York with Rev. Jeffrey Childs and Rev. Carlton VanOrnum officiating. Burial was in Stockbridge Cemetery, Stockbridge, NY.

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DR. JAMES EVERETT TOWNSEND



Dr. James Everett Townsend was born December 16, 1930 in Canby, Minnesota. He was the third child of Ora Milton Townsend, Sr., and Helen Rice Townsend. Raised in Granite City, Illinois, Dr. Townsend answered God's call to ministry in 1948 and served churches as a student pastor in Illinois, Colorado and New York. He subsequently earned four academic degrees: Bachelor of Arts, McKendree College, Illinois (1952); Master of Theology, Colgate-Rochester Divinity School, New York (1956); Master of Arts with honors in Journalism, Syracuse University (1970); and Doctor of Ministry with honors from Vanderbilt University (1988).

Dr. Townsend joined the United States Air Force in 1956, the same year he was ordained an Elder in Full Connection by the North Central New York Annual Conference. He served as a chaplain until 1982, and retired with the rank of colonel. His overseas assignments took him to Korea, Germany and Vietnam. Other assignments included Command Chaplain at the United States Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs, Colorado, and Chief of the Professional Division, Office of the Chief of Chaplains, in Washington, D. C. He was twice awarded the Legion of Merit, the nation's second highest service medal, plus the Air Force Commendation Medal and National Service Defense Medal twice. He also received the Bronze Star and other honors for his service in Vietnam.

Following military service, Dr. Townsend served as a Director of the Division of Chaplains and Related Ministries of the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry of The United Methodist Church in Nashville, Tennessee. In 1986, he was promoted to Associate General Secretary of the agency, with oversight for all United Methodist clergy serving as armed forces chaplains, at health care institutions and correctional facilities, or pastoral counselors. Dr. Townsend helped design the curriculum and recruit faculty for the business management and administration school at Africa University in Zimbabwe, and founded its first endowed professorship. The Wesley Divinity School of the Philippines named its library in honor of Dr. Townsend.

At the time of his retirement from active ministry in 1997, he had served 49 years under Episcopal appointment. Dr. Townsend then served part time as an associate pastor at Bethlehem United Methodist Church, Franklin, Tennessee, where he was affiliated for 22 years. The church's adult education and music programs, plus its ministries with homeless people benefited from his gifts and graces. As a church music lyricist, Dr. Townsend published two cantatas and more than 90 anthems in his lifetime.

He is survived by his wife of 54 years, Billie Jean Goodwin Townsend of Brentwood, Tennessee; three sons, J. Kenneth (Nancy) Townsend of Nashville, Tennessee; David T. Townsend of Chicago, Illinois; and Jay E. (Mary) Townsend of Annandale, Virginia; plus one daughter, Twila J. (Ardy) Zirakzadeh of Louisville, Colorado. Dr. Townsend also had three grandsons and five granddaughters, plus two great-grandchildren.

Following his death on November 16, 2004, at age 73 from osteomyelitis, a memorial service was held on November 19 at Bethlehem United Methodist Church. On March 28, 2005 (Easter Monday), he was buried with full military honors at Arlington National Cemetery, Washington, D.C.

Lawrence E. "Larry" was born to this world on October 19th, 1946, son of Gerald C. and Vivian J. Bracy Woodcock. There were five brothers and sisters: Ernie, Peggy, John and Nancy. All together they grew up in the city of Ogdensburg where, in 1965, Larry graduated from Ogdensburg Free Academy.

In 1965 he became a U.S. Marine and proudly served his country in Viet Nam. After leaving the service in 1969, Larry entered Canton Agricultural and Technical College. He received an associate's degree in business administration in 1971 and went on to Plattsburg State University College to obtain a bachelor's degree, also in business, in 1973.

It was at Plattsburg State that Larry met his future wife, the then Joyce M. Thoma of Lowville. The marriage covenant was sealed on July 19, 1975, at the Lowville United Methodist Church, with Rev. Robert Nay officiating.

Larry's greatest loves were for God, God's people, and the military. He was a longtime member of the Lowville United Methodist Church serving for many years as an usher and as President of the Board of Trustees. In May of 2004, Larry transferred his membership to the Second United Methodist Church of Champion where his wife was serving as a licensed local pastor.

Larry liked everyone. His younger years were spent in poverty. Later this bore the fruit of his great compassion for those who were down on their luck. Larry's authenticity endeared him to those wary of the "social welfare system." For others this made him "not a part of the in gang", but this didn't concern him. His anger rose only to the injustices that were perpetrated against the innocent.

Almost twenty years of Larry's career was as a tele-conferencing/media technician at Ft. Drum. He spent many long hours bringing together soldiers with their families back home over satellite systems. In times of worldwide conflict, he connected high army officials around this world. Larry loved his work with the military and it showed in his many awards for job excellence, among which was the Department of the Army's highest honor for civilian employees, the Achievement Medal for Civilian Service awarded on March 2, 1998.

When Larry wasn't working he enjoyed 50's and 60's music, watching sports (NY Yankees!) and traveling. He was a member of the Lowville Fire Dept. and President of the Lewis County Fire Police for many years.

In December of 2003, he was diagnosed with a little known pulmonary disease with no cure. Although the doctor talked about what would happen five or ten years down the line, he was born to the Lord only 7 months later, June 29, 2004. The celebration of his life was held on July 3, 2004, at the Second United Methodist Church of Champion with the Rev. Joseph L. Clark officiating. His interment was in West Lowville Cemetery with a luncheon following at the Woolworth Memorial United Methodist Church in Great Bend.

What I will never forget is how he gave of himself the last five years to be in partnership with me through seminary, internship, and parish work. This meant not only spending hours alone while I studied, but also carrying for a mother-in-law with Alzheimer's. He always had supporting words and hugs of comfort.
